This request relates to native landscaping. I represent the group that organized FM Flutter Fest during Pollinator Week, on June 17, 2025. We had a successful community event and planted a pollinator garden at Gooseberry Park, with great support from the City of Moorhead, Clay County Master Gardeners, and University of Minnesota Extension. We will have a similar event in June of 2026. We plan to plant another learning garden in Gooseberry Park this summer, and hope to continue planting a new learning garden each summer, partnering with the city. We have scheduled a presentation from Dr. Doug Tallamy, a professor of entomology and wildlife ecology at the University of Delaware, a New York Times Best Selling book author, and author of many scholarly books and papers. He is also the recipient of many awards, including the 2019 Cynthia Westcott Scientific writing award. He is the co-
