Add water features such as cascade fountains to attract birds, butterflies, etc. Fun for children too!







Given \$ amount available, best to concentrate on one area so it will be noticeable and have impact. The "gathering place" idea along the river in old, original Moorhead, sounds great to me.

Improve pavement on trail along river by the Hammocks Center.

Municipal compost pilot project they have good system in Fergus Falls+ South going east from 20th Street has several sections that are in bad condition.

Improve the existing bike and walking paths by filling in the cracks and ruts. The path on 12th Ave South between 34th Street and 40th Street has large cracks. The path on 30th Ave South going east from 20th Street has several sections that are in bad condition.

The Bluesham theater has acres of mowed lawn which could be restored to native grasses and wildflowers which would provide habitat, beauty, benefits to clean air and water, and an inspiring community example, versus a mowed lawn that requires frequent regular fuel use and many hours staff time. What an opportunity!

I think the money should be used for something that will more broadly benefit the community. One time funding of clay county food shelves. Would be a great way to use the funds. Helping to offset the lakes and Prairies senior transportation bus that had funding cut this year. That is an asset to Moorhead and public health. If pollinator habitat is an important job helping fund clay county master gardeners that does work maintaining these plots through out the community

Tear down the library and build a community center that can host youth sporting events. How about a tax zone that matches ND business costs vs in Moorhead.

In particular, I'd love to see a bench or 2 installed on the trail through Aylson Park and neighborhood. Many elders walk this path and could use a pit stop or 2.

This request relates to native landscaping. I represent the group that organized FM Flutter Fest during Pollinator Week, on June 17, 2025. We had a successful community event and planted a pollinator garden at Gooseberry Park, with great support from the City of Moorhead, Clay County Master Gardeners, and University of Minnesota Extension. We will have a similar event in June of 2026. We plan to plant another learning garden in Gooseberry Park this summer, and hope to continue planting a new learning garden each summer, partnering with the city. We have scheduled a presentation on Dr. Doug Tallamy, a professor of entomology and wildlife ecology at the University of Delaware, a New York Times Best Selling book author, and author of many scholarly books and papers. He is also the recipient of many awards, including the 2019 Cynthia Westcott Scientific Writing Award. He is the co-founder of the nonprofit Homegrown National Park. Dr. Tallamy is an inspiring speaker and will have a great impact on our community with his presentation, Nature's Best Hope: A New Approach to Conservation That Starts in Your Yard. He has inspired people across the country to plant native plants in their own yards as well as in their communities, having an extremely positive impact on wildlife, the food web, and the environment. Dr. Tallamy's speaker fee and travel expenses are around \$5,000. I would love to have the city allocate \$5,000 of the settlement money towards Dr. Tallamy's presentation. Meritna Wheeler

Native prairie isn't always the best choice in the river corridor. Plant native shrubs where appropriate, and native prairie where it is best suited. Prairie plantings or other restoration will be easier to maintain if the right plant is put in the right place.

Snow removal equipment to follow regular plow that dumps piles of ice into my driveway that I am unable to remove. Smaller second plow would have movable blade that would clear my driveway of debris left by larger plow!!! I must pay neighbors to undo City bungling each winter.

Give the money back to the people of Moorhead, who are spending too much in property taxes and assessments. Our monthly tax bill is now the same as our public service bill. To try to spend money just to spend it seems ridiculous. Give it to every family in Moorhead that pays property taxes. A refund. Thanks.


